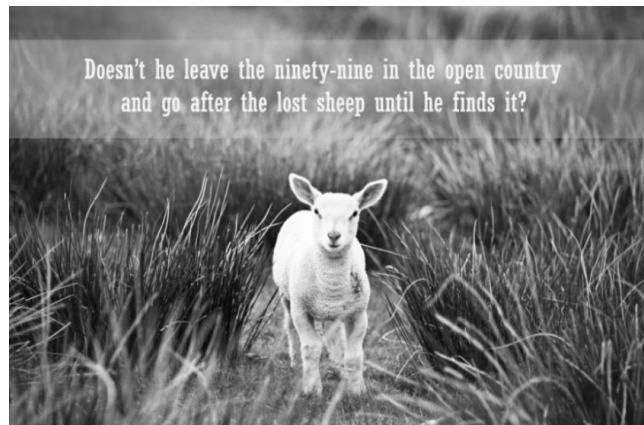


Friday 11th June 2021 newsletter

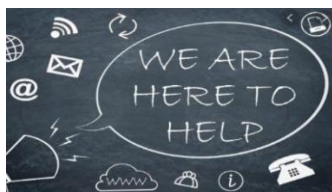


Help and support

Thank you in advance for your support with our Children's Fundraising Committee fundraising efforts.

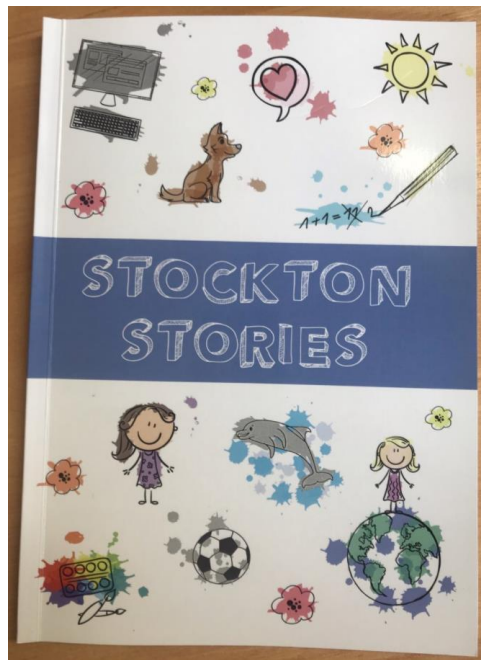
Stockton Stories
